Directions to the Troy Hilton Garden Inn

From the north:

Take the Adirondack Northway/I-87 South to Exit 7/NY-7 East toward Troy/Cohoes. Follow Route 7 for about five miles. At the bottom of the bridge, go straight through the light and proceed up the hill on Hoosick Street. The Hilton Garden Inn Troy is three quarters of a mile up the hill on the left.

From the south:

Take the NYS Thruway/ I-87 North toward Albany. Merge onto I-787 North via Exit 23 (Downtown Albany/Rensselaer/ Troy). Continue on I-787 for about nine miles. Merge onto NY-7 via Exit 9E toward Troy/Bennington. Continue on NY-7 East/ Hoosick Street up the hill. The Hilton Garden Inn Troy is three quarters of a mile up the hill on the left.

From the east:

Route 7/Hoosick Street goes directly into Troy from the east and Vermont. Follow Route 7 as it starts to head down the hill, toward the Hudson River, as you cross over South Lake Avenue. Follow Route 7 through the light at Burdett Avenue. The Hilton Garden Inn Troy is immediately to your right. There are entrances before and after the building.

From the west:

Take I-90 to Albany and exit onto I-787 North. Follow the "From the south" directions.
